Building upon the legacy of its predecessor, Westerlaken Foundation extends its scope, with a primary emphasis on funding research in the domains of marine environment, human rights, and children's rights. Our foundation places a particular emphasis on the synergy between these key areas of focus, recognizing their interconnectedness and the profound impact they have on our world.

In addition to its core pursuits, Westerlaken Foundation actively supports emergency relief efforts and provides valuable expertise in the realm of cultural heritage management. Furthermore, our foundation occasionally contributes to initiatives aimed at repatriating cultural heritage to Bali, acknowledging the significance of preserving and celebrating the rich cultural heritage of the region. Our holistic approach to these multifaceted issues underscores our commitment to creating a better future for Bali and its inhabitants.

How will the foundation reach its purpose?

Westerlaken Foundation operates in a demand-driven manner. Initially, individuals or NGOs with a focus on South East Asia, particularly Indonesia, are welcome to seek funding from the Westerlaken Foundation, with a primary emphasis on supporting the initiatives of our partner branch, Yayasan Bali Bersih. In specific situations, the Westerlaken Foundation will proactively seek collaborative partners, particularly in the realm of emergency relief efforts.

To gather the necessary funds, Westerlaken Foundation will rely on the support of both regular monthly donors and occasional contributors through crowdfunding initiatives. This diversified approach to fundraising will enable us to sustain our mission and respond effectively to the evolving needs of the communities we serve.

Plans for 2023:

Human rights and children rights program

- Continuing the "Stop Orphanages" program through research, advocacy, and awareness campaigns.
- Sustaining our consultancy role in child welfare institutions, collaborating with both governmental and non-governmental organizations to facilitate reunifications.
- Persevering with the Jodie O'Shea Children Fund to support vulnerable children.
- Expanding our commitment to the HIV/AIDS education program.
- Exploring the possibility of launching a second medical program.
- Initiating the establishment of an Empowerment Centre and Empowerment Gardens to empower individuals and communities.

Marine environment program

- Sustaining our role as the primary responder for marine strandings.
- Persevering in our research efforts to address marine-related challenges.
- Continuing our advocacy for the rights of captive marine animals.
- Enforcing the implementation of a code of conduct for dolphin watching in Lovina.
- Pioneering the establishment of a seapen for rehabilitation and entering into a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with BPSPL.

Cultural Heritage Program

- Continuing the quest to identify items for return within the private sector.
- Persisting in our advocacy efforts to champion the rights of indigenous communities in the repatriation of looted heritage.
